National Honors Society Concordia Academy 2021-2022 Membership Handbook



Bylaws

Article I: Name and Purpose

Section 1: The name of this chapter shall be *Concordia Academy Chapter of the National Honors Society of Secondary Schools.*

Section 2: The objective of this chapter shall be to foster enthusiasm for scholarship, to encourage positive leadership and responsible citizenship in service to school and community.

Article II: Membership

Section 1: Membership in this chapter will be referred to as active and graduate. Active members become graduate members upon graduation of high school. Graduate members have no vote.

Section 2: Membership into this chapter shall be based on Scholarship, Service, Leadership, and Character.

Section 3: To be eligible for election into this chapter, the candidate must have been in attendance for a period of one semester at Concordia Academy. Students who are active members in their previous schools' chapter can transfer membership to Concordia Academy.

Section 4: Candidates for election into this chapter can be members of the junior or senior class. Candidates eligible for this must have the required GPA of 3.5. The scholastic level of eligibility is fixed and will be required as the minimum scholarship level of achievement for candidacy into this program.

Article III: Election of Members

Section 1: The final election of members into this chapter shall be by faculty council consisting of five staff members at Concordia Academy. The chapter advisor is an ex-officio member of this council.

Section 2: Prior to the final election, the following shall occur:

- 1. Students' academic records shall be reviewed to determine eligibility.
- 2. Students who are eligible will be notified and asked to fill out a membership form. Failure to return the form by the assigned date drops the candidate from further processing.
- 3. The entire school faculty shall be requested to comment on each candidates' leadership, character, and service with the council making its final decision.

Section 3: The election of active members shall be held once a year in October.

Article IV: Dismissal

Section 1: The faculty council in compliance with the rules and regulations of National Honor Society shall determine the procedures for dismissal. A written procedure is listed in the appendix.

Section 2: Members who fall below the standard will be notified in writing and given reasonable amount of time to correct the deficiency. In the cases of flagrant violation of school or civil rules, a member does not have to be warned in writing.

Section 3: The faculty council shall determine an appropriate number of warnings.

Section 4: In all cases of impending dismissal, a member has the right to be heard before the faculty council.

Section 5: A member who has been dismissed may appeal this decision to the principal of the school.

Section 6: The National Council and the NASSP shall hear no appeals.

Section 7: Dismissal or violation of ethics of National Honors Society can include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Lack of academic integrity: cheating in the forms of copying/stealing work, plagiarism, excessive absences.
- 2. Destructive behavior: destruction of school or community property, use of alcohol or drugs at school or in the community.

3. Offenders of school conduct: dress code, use of profanity, unexcused

absences, disrespect to other or staff.

Article VI: Activities and Membership Obligations

Section 1: The chapter shall complete one or more service opportunities each

year.

Section 2: All members shall fully and enthusiastically promote and participate in

these projects.

Section 3: These projects shall have the following characteristics: fulfill a need

within the school or community, have the support of administration and faculty,

be appropriate and educationally defensible, and be well-planned, executed, and

organized.

Section 4: Each member shall have the duty to choose and participate in an

individual service project. This service project must be approved by the chapter

advisor and/or faculty advisor.

Section 5: The chapter and individual members will publicize its projects in

positive ways.

Article V: Meetings

Section 1: Chapters will hold meetings throughout the year. Members are

required to attend. Members who have missed a meeting have three days to

appeal the excuse to one of the council before a written warning may commence.

Article VI: Dues

Section 1: No dues shall be required of active members.

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Appendix A Dismissal Process

- 1. Academic warnings, suspensions and dismissals are listed in the bylaws.
- 2. Members who fall below the standards of eligibility or conduct shall receive a written warning and receiving reasonable time to correct the deficiency.
- 3. The Concordia Academy National Honor Society maintains high expectation for its members. Immediate dismissal can occur for flagrant behavior.
- 4. The Faculty Council shall determine when a member has exceeded reasonable time or amount of warnings.
- 5. In all cases of impending dismissal, the member has a right to a hearing.
 - a. The student has five days from knowledge of dismissal to request a hearing before the faculty council, faculty advisor and principal. The member must provide written desire for hearing to the faculty advisor.
 - b. Dismissal results in a member completing a restorative consequence for re-eligibility or may result in permanent dismissal from the chapter.

Social Issues

- Best Buddies pairs high school students in one-to-one friendships with students with disabilities.
- Child Lures Protection educates teens to keep them safe from sexual abuse and abduction.
- **Habitat for Humanity** offers volunteering opportunities related to their mission of providing adequate housing for people across the world and raising global awareness of housing issues.
